- **"Even Hand"** (between *Ghost Story* and *Cold Days*) - A story from the perspective of Marcone.
- **"Cold Case"** (between *Cold Days* and *Skin Game*) - A story about Molly Carpenter after her transformation.
- **"Jury Duty"** (between *Skin Game* and *Peace Talks*) - A comedic story about Harry serving jury duty.
- **"Day One"** (between *Skin Game* and *Peace Talks*) - A story about Butters becoming a Knight.
- **"A Fistful of Warlocks"** (between *Skin Game* and *Peace Talks*) - A story about Luccio in the Wild West.
- **"Zoo Day"** (between *Skin Game* and *Peace Talks*) - A story told from three perspectives: Harry, Maggie, and Mouse.

For the most complete experience, you can read these stories as you progress through the main novels. However, many readers prefer to finish the main novels first and then go back to the short story collections. Both approaches work, but reading them in chronological order adds depth.
