Ralphie’s catchphrase, "TV or not TV? That is the question!" was delivered with perfect comic timing. Stone later went on to voice other roles in animation, but his work on the bus remains a fan favorite.

Keesha Franklin - The Practical Leader

Voiced by **Erica Luttrell**, Keesha was the sensible, no-nonsense student who often organized the group’s efforts. Luttrell’s voice brought a calm authority to Keesha, making her the voice of reason when the bus adventured into chaos. She was the one who would remind everyone to listen to Ms. Frizzle—or at least try to make sense of the situation.

Dorothy Ann (D.A.) - The Book Smarts

J.D. Daniels voiced Dorothy Ann, the class know-it-all who preferred books over hands-on experience. Daniels gave D.A. a slightly formal, professorial tone that made her lines about "According to my research..." both funny and endearing. The contrast between her book knowledge and the messy reality of the bus trips was a recurring source of humor.

Tim Jamal - The Musician and Artist

Voiced by **Andre Ottley-Lorant**, Tim was the creative, thoughtful student who often expressed himself through music or art. Ottley-Lorant’s gentle voice made Tim a calm presence amidst the chaos. His character wasn’t always the loudest, but he was always observant, and his contributions often helped solve problems in creative ways.

Wanda Li - The Enthusiastic Dreamer

Lisa Yamanaka voiced Wanda, the spirited, imaginative girl who was always excited about the next field trip. Yamanaka’s energetic performance made Wanda’s enthusiasm infectious. She was the one who would shout "Wow!" at every new discovery, and her optimism balanced out Arnold’s anxiety. Wanda also had a unique bond with Ralphie, often competing in good-natured ways.

Carlos Ramon - The Jokester

Voiced by **Daniel DeSanto**, Carlos was the class comedian. DeSanto gave Carlos a quick, punchy delivery for his terrible puns and jokes. Carlos would often make a bad joke at the worst possible moment, earning groans from his classmates. His humor lightened many tense moments, and DeSanto’s timing made even the worst puns enjoyable. DeSanto later gained fame as a live-action actor in the *Mean Girls* movie and the *Scary Movie* franchise, but for many, he will always be Carlos from the bus.

Phoebe Terese - The New Girl with a Scientific Mind

Originally, the class had a different student named Phoebe, introduced in the third season. She was voiced by **Maia Filar**. Phoebe was the shy, thoughtful new student who had transferred from another school. Filar’s soft voice gave Phoebe a gentle, inquisitive quality. She often asked deep questions and provided a fresh perspective. Her character was slightly older in tone, adding another layer to the group dynamic.

Supporting Characters and Guest Stars

Beyond the main cast, the **Magic School Bus TV show cast** included a wonderful ensemble of supporting characters.
