a character switch that emulates different room types. The **Delay** includes a ping-pong mode and tempo sync. When you stack these effects using Racks, you can build complex signal chains without bogging down your CPU. Audio and MIDI Capabilities in Live 8

Create an Effect Rack with three parallel chains: one for a clean signal, one for distortion, and one for reverb. Then map a macro knob to cross-fade between the chains.
