

How To Ship A Package

Selecting the Correct Box or Envelope

These remnants can confuse sorting machines and cause your package to be misrouted. Essential Cushioning and Protective Materials

- **Foam inserts or foam sheets** – Great for fitting snugly around oddly shaped objects.
- **Air pillows** – Lightweight and effective for filling empty space without adding significant weight.
- **Kraft paper** – Suitable for wrapping non-fragile items and providing a barrier against moisture.

For particularly valuable or delicate shipments, consider double-boxing. Place your item in a smaller box with ample cushioning, then place that smaller box inside a larger box with additional padding. This technique is often required for shipping musical instruments, glassware, and expensive electronics.

Selecting the Right Tape

Not all tapes are created equal for shipping purposes. Avoid using masking tape, scotch tape, or duct tape for sealing packages, as these can easily fail during transit. Instead, use **pressure-sensitive plastic tape** (often referred to as packing tape) that is at least two inches wide. Apply the tape along the center seam of the box and extend it several inches down the sides for a secure seal. For heavier boxes, use the H-taping method by running tape along all open seams and flaps.

Step 2: Weighing and Measuring Your Package Accurately

Once your package is properly packed and sealed, you need to determine its weight and dimensions. Carriers base their shipping rates on two factors: actual weight and dimensional weight (also known as DIM weight). Understanding this concept is crucial when learning **how to ship a package** cost-effectively.

Understanding Dimensional Weight

Dimensional weight accounts for the amount of space a package occupies relative to its actual weight. Carriers calculate DIM weight by multiplying the package's length, width, and height and then dividing by a specific divisor (usually 139 for domestic shipments). If the dimensional weight exceeds the actual weight, you will be charged based on the DIM weight. This means that shipping a large, lightweight box can be surprisingly expensive. To minimize costs, always use the smallest box that can safely accommodate your items without compressing them.

Tools You Will Need

Invest in a reliable digital scale that can measure in both pounds and kilograms. Many shipping scales are available at reasonable prices and connect directly to shipping software for automated rate calculation. For measuring dimensions, use a rigid measuring tape and measure the longest points on each side, rounding up to the nearest whole inch. Carriers generally require dimension rounding, so a box that measures 10.2 inches by 8.6 inches should be recorded as 11 inches by 9 inches.

Step 3: Choosing a Carrier and Service Level

With your package prepared and measured, you now face one of the most consequential decisions in **how to ship a package**: selecting the carrier and service speed. The major players in the United States include the United States Postal Service (USPS), UPS, FedEx, and DHL for international shipments. Each has distinct strengths and pricing structures.

USPS: Best for Small and Lightweight Packages

The USPS is often the most affordable option for small, lightweight packages under 10 pounds. Priority Mail provides flat-rate boxes that allow you to ship items at a fixed price regardless of weight (within limits), making it an excellent choice for heavy but compact items. First-Class Package Service is ideal for very small shipments weighing under one pound. However, USPS tracking is not as robust as private carriers, and delivery timelines can vary.

UPS and FedEx: Reliable for Larger and Heavier Items

Both UPS and FedEx offer comprehensive services for packages of all sizes, with superior tracking technology and more reliable delivery windows. UPS Ground and FedEx Ground are cost-effective for heavier shipments that do not require immediate delivery. For time-sensitive packages, options like UPS Next Day Air or FedEx Priority Overnight guarantee delivery by specific times the following morning. These carriers also offer robust insurance options and signature confirmation services.

International Shipping Considerations

When shipping across borders, you must complete customs documentation, including a detailed description of the contents, their value, and their country of origin. Each carrier provides specific forms for international shipping, and you may need to include commercial invoices for business shipments. Research destination country regulations regarding prohibited items and potential duties or taxes that the recipient may need to pay.

Using Extra Labels and Fragile Markings

If your package contains fragile items, apply "FRAGILE" or "HANDLE WITH CARE" stickers on multiple sides of the box. While these markings do not guarantee gentle handling, they can

encourage extra attention from sorting personnel. For large or heavy packages, consider adding "TEAM LIFT" labels to advise handlers that the package requires more than one person to lift safely. Some carriers offer specific labels for hazardous materials, perishable goods, or lithium batteries, so check your carrier's guidelines if your shipment contains any special contents.
