Essential Grooming Tools for a Pomeranian

Before you begin, having the correct equipment is half the battle. Using the wrong brush, for example, can break the hair shafts or irritate the skin. Here is a list of non-negotiable items for your grooming kit.

Brushes and Combs

- **Slicker Brush:** This is your primary tool. Look for one with fine, bent wires that are gentle on the skin. It is excellent for removing loose undercoat and preventing mats.
- **Metal Greyhound Comb:** A comb with both wide and fine teeth is essential. This is the best tool for checking your work and removing smaller tangles, especially around the ears, legs, and tail.
- **Pin Brush:** Ideal for general brushing and fluffing the outer coat. Choose one with rounded tips to prevent scratching.
- **Undercoat Rake:** For heavy shedding seasons, an undercoat rake is a lifesaver. It

reaches deep into the undercoat to remove dead hair without cutting the topcoat.

Bathing and Drying Supplies

- **Dog-Specific Shampoo and Conditioner:** Use a high-quality, moisturizing formula designed for double coats. A whitening or color-enhancing shampoo can help brighten the coat color.
- **Blow Dryer with Nozzle:** A human hair dryer is often too hot and weak. A pet dryer with variable speed and heat settings is a wise investment. A high-velocity dryer is excellent for blowing out the undercoat.
- **Styptic Powder:** Accidents happen. This powder is essential for stopping bleeding if you accidentally nick a nail.

Step 1: The Pre-Bath Preparation and Brushing

The single most common mistake new owners make is attempting to bathe a matted Pomeranian. Water and soap will only tighten mats, making them nearly impossible to remove without shaving. Therefore, thorough brushing must always come first. Begin by placing your Pom on a non-slip surface. A grooming table is ideal, but the floor works as long as your dog feels secure.

Start by misting the coat lightly with a detangling spray or a mixture of water and conditioner. This reduces static and makes brushing easier. Using your slicker brush, work in small sections. Hold the hair at the root with your free hand to avoid pulling the skin. Brush the tips first, then gradually work your way down to the skin. Never yank or saw at a tangle. If you encounter a mat, carefully use the tip of the slicker brush to gently tease it apart. For stubborn mats, use the greyhound comb to carefully split the mat horizontally.

Pay special attention to "hot spots" for matting:

- Behind the ears
- Under the collar
- The armpits and groin area
- The back of the thighs (culottes)
- The tail area

A fully brushed Pomeranian should look silky and stand away from the body. You should be able to run a comb from the skin to the tip of the hair without catching any snags. Only when the coat is completely tangle-free should you move to the bath.

Step 2: Bathing Your Pomeranian Correctly

Bathing a Pomeranian is an art. Their double coat is water-resistant, meaning it takes a bit of work to get it wet thoroughly. Use lukewarm water—not hot, not cold. Place a cotton ball in each ear to prevent water from entering the ear canal, which can lead to infections. Wet your Pom completely from the neck down, avoiding spraying water directly into their face.

Use a cup or a wet washcloth for the head.

Dilute the shampoo with water in a bottle before applying it. This ensures even distribution and prevents a high concentration of soap in one spot. Work the shampoo into a rich lather, massaging gently into the coat and down to the skin. Focus on areas that get dirty, like the paws and the rear. Be very careful around the eyes and mouth. Rinse thoroughly—this is the most critical part. Any leftover residue will cause itching and a dull coat. Rinse, rinse, and rinse again until the water runs completely clear.

Follow up with a high-quality conditioner. This is non-negotiable for a Pomeranian. Conditioner closes the hair cuticle, adds moisture, and provides slip for easier drying and brushing. Let it sit for a minute or two, then rinse thoroughly again.

Step 3: The Drying Process

Drying is where many beginners get frustrated. A Pomeranian should never be left to air dry. Trapped moisture against the skin can lead to hot spots, fungus, and mildew. Furthermore, air drying leaves the coat flat, stringy, and prone to tangling. The goal is to fluff the coat as it dries.

After bathing, gently squeeze excess water out of the coat with a microfiber towel. Do not rub, as this causes tangles. Blot the coat dry. Then, use your blow dryer on a low or medium heat setting. Use the nozzle to direct the airflow. Start by drying the body, using your slicker brush or a pin brush in the other hand. This technique, known as "line brushing" while drying, is the secret to a professional finish. You are essentially straightening and fluffing the hair as the water evaporates.

Blow the coat in the direction of hair growth. For the ultimate fluff, some owners blow the coat backward (against the grain) and then forward. Never hold the dryer too close to the skin. Use your fingers to lift the coat, constantly moving the dryer to avoid burning the skin. A thorough drying can take 45 minutes to over an hour. The coat should feel completely dry and stand off the body when you are finished.

Step 4: Nail, Ear, and Dental Care

Grooming is not just about the coat. A complete grooming session includes essential maintenance that contributes to your Pom's overall health.

Nail Trimming

Pomeranians have small, delicate feet. Overly long nails can cause pain, splayed feet, and joint issues. Use a pair of scissor-type or guillotine nail clippers designed for small dogs. Trim only the curved tip, avoiding the "quick" (the pink vein inside the nail). For dogs with black nails, trim tiny slivers at a time until you see a black dot in the center of the cut surface—this means the quick is near. If you are unsure, use a nail grinder (Dremel) for more control. Always have styptic powder on hand.

Ear Cleaning

Pomeranians can be prone to ear infections due to their fluffy, drop ears. After the bath, remove the cotton balls and inspect the ears. They should be pink, clean, and odorless. Use a vet-approved ear cleaner and a cotton ball (never a Q-tip) to gently wipe the visible part of the ear canal and the folds. Do not probe deep.

Dental Hygiene

Small breeds are notorious for dental disease. Grooming time is a perfect opportunity for a quick teeth brushing. Use a dog-specific toothbrush and toothpaste. Focus on the gum line. Regular brushing prevents plaque, bad breath, and painful tooth loss.

Step 5: The Face and Paw Trim

While Pomeranians are typically kept in a natural, full coat, some tidy trimming enhances their classic "teddy bear" look. Use a pair of small, straight shears and a pair of curved shears for precision. It is very easy to over-trim a Pom, so proceed with caution.

- **Paws:** The hair between the paw pads and around the foot can collect dirt and become matted. Carefully trim the hair that grows between the pads to the level of the pad itself. Then, trim the hair over the top of the foot in a neat, rounded "cat foot" shape.
- **Face:** Trim the whiskers if desired. Use the curved shears to round the hair over the eyes, creating a clean window. Brush the ear hair forward and trim a neat curve to match the shape of the ear leather. A little goes a long way.
- **Sanitary Area:** Keeping the hair around the genitals and anus short is crucial for hygiene. Use a small clipper with a #10 blade or carefully with scissors to keep this area neat.

Establishing a Grooming Schedule

Consistency is key to a beautiful coat. You will not achieve a tangle-free Pom with occasional grooming. Stick to this schedule for the best results.

- **Daily:** Quick 5-minute brush with a pin brush and a comb-through to check for tangles. Check the eyes and face for tear stains.
- **Weekly:** Full line-brushing session with a slicker brush and undercoat rake. Check ears, nails, and teeth.
- **Every 3-4 weeks:** Bath, blow-dry, and full grooming session.
- **Every 6-8 weeks:** Professional grooming is recommended, especially for the "Pomeranian cut."

A Note on Cutting the Coat

There is a controversial topic in the Pomeranian world: shaving. Double-coated breeds like the Pomeranian should never be shaved to the skin unless medically necessary (e.g., for surgery or severe matting). The coat acts as an insulator against both heat and cold. Shaving destroys the coat's natural ability to regulate temperature and can damage the hair follicles, leading to "coat funk"—a condition where the coat grows back patchy, thin, or not at all. If you want a shorter cut, ask your groomer for a "puppy cut" or "bear cut" that leaves at least an inch of hair to protect the skin.
