

Homemade Kidney Diet For Cats

- **B Vitamins and Antioxidants:** These are lost through excessive urination and need to be replenished.

Essential Ingredients for a Homemade Kidney Diet for Cats

Building a balanced homemade diet requires a mix of specific ingredients. The foundation typically includes a lean animal protein, a non-phosphorus binder, a fat source, and a complete vitamin-mineral premix formulated for felines.

Protein Sources

Choose fresh, lean, and high-quality meats. The goal is to provide essential amino acids without excessive phosphorus. Chicken breast (skinned and boneless), turkey breast, rabbit, and certain cuts of beef or pork (very lean) are good options. Egg whites are an excellent, low-phosphorus protein source often recommended by veterinary nutritionists. Avoid organ meats like liver and kidney in large amounts, as they are very high in phosphorus.

Low-Phosphorus Carbohydrates and Vegetables

While cats are obligate carnivores, small amounts of certain vegetables can provide fiber and nutrients without adding significant phosphorus. Cooked white rice (in limited amounts), peeled zucchini, green beans, and butternut squash are lower in phosphorus than grains like brown rice or oats. These should never be the main component of the diet, but can aid in texture and palatability.

Fats and Oils

A healthy fat source is important for energy and essential fatty acids. Fish oil (high in EPA and DHA) is a cornerstone of the renal diet. Canola oil or sunflower oil can be used for additional calories. Avoid saturated fats like butter or lard, as they are harder to digest and can contribute to inflammation.

Supplements and Binders

No homemade diet for cats, especially one for kidney disease, can be complete without proper supplementation. Essential additives include:

- **Phosphorus Binders:** Ingredients like aluminum hydroxide or calcium carbonate are often added to further reduce phosphorus absorption. This should only be done under veterinary guidance.
- **Calcium Source:** Usually calcium carbonate or eggshell powder to maintain the correct calcium-to-phosphorus ratio.
- **B-Complex Vitamins:** CKD cats lose water-soluble vitamins. Thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, and B12 are especially important.
- **Taurine:** An essential amino acid for cats that must be supplemented in homemade diets.
- **Potassium Citrate:** Often used to manage metabolic acidosis and provide potassium, which can be low in CKD cats.
- **Vitamin D and E:** These fat-soluble vitamins support immune function and bone health.

Sample Recipes: Homemade Kidney Diet For Cats

Below are two simple, balanced recipes that can serve as a starting point. Always consult your veterinarian before introducing any new diet, and monitor your cat's blood work regularly. These recipes assume you are using a complete supplement premix. Adjust portion sizes based on your cat's caloric needs.

Recipe 1: Simple Chicken and Rice Renal Diet

Ingredients:

- 1 lb boneless, skinless chicken breast (cooked and shredded)
- 1/2 cup cooked white rice
- 1/4 cup peeled, finely chopped zucchini (cooked)
- 2 tbsp fish oil (from a high-quality supplement)

Recipe 2: Turkey and Egg White Renal Blend

Ingredients:

- 1 lb ground turkey breast (93/7 lean)
- 4 egg whites, hard-boiled and finely chopped
- 1/4 cup cooked, mashed butternut squash
- 2 tbsp canola oil
- 1 complete feline vitamin-mineral premix (follow package directions for 1 lb of meat)
- Potassium citrate (as recommended by your vet)

Instructions:

1. Brown the ground turkey in a non-stick pan until fully cooked. Drain any excess fat.
2. Hard-boil the eggs, peel, and discard the yolks. Chop the whites finely.
3. Steam or boil the butternut squash until soft, then mash.
4. Combine the cooked turkey, egg whites, and mashed squash in a bowl.
5. Add canola oil, the vitamin-mineral premix, and any additional supplements like potassium citrate.
6. Mix well and add water or unsalted chicken broth to desired consistency.
7. Refrigerate and use within 3 days, or freeze for longer storage.

Transitioning to a Homemade Kidney Diet

Cats can be notoriously resistant to dietary changes, especially when they are not feeling well. Transitioning gradually is key to success. Start by mixing 10-20% of the new homemade food with 80-90% of their current diet. Over 7-14 days, slowly increase the proportion of homemade food while decreasing the old diet. If your cat refuses to eat for more than 24 hours, consult your veterinarian immediately, as inappetence in CKD cats can quickly lead to hepatic lipidosis.

Monitoring Your Cat's Response

- **Adding Forbidden Ingredients:** Onions, garlic (in any form), grapes, raisins, and excessive salt are toxic or harmful to cats. Always check labels.
