fights the youma, eventually learning she must use the tiara. She defeats the monster but is terrified and crying. The man she saved thanks her, and Usagi is shocked to see the gem she received is a "Star Seed" (or "Crystal Point" in the DiC dub).

6. **The First Act of Mercy:** Instead of killing the youma completely, Usagi uses the brooch's light to purify the man, turning him back into a normal human. This act of mercy is the central theme of the entire series, making this first episode a clear statement of intent.

The Soundtrack: A Key Difference in the Dubs

One of the most jarring differences between the two dubs is the audio. In the DiC version of the **Sailor Moon Episode 1 English Dub Youtube** upload, you will hear the famous "English Moonlight Densetsu" theme song ("It's a ray of light, it's a beam of love...").
