Ecology and Biomes

Questions in this section cover food webs, energy flow, biogeochemical cycles (carbon, nitrogen, water), population growth models, and community interactions (competition, predation, symbiosis). A sample test might show a graph of a logistic growth curve and ask you to interpret carrying capacity. Example:

Sample Question: Which of the following biogeochemical cycles depends primarily on bacteria for converting a key element into a form usable by plants?

- A) Carbon cycle
B) Nitrogen cycle
C) Phosphorus cycle
D) Water cycle

Answer: B) Nitrogen cycle. Bacteria fix atmospheric N₂ into ammonia (NH₃), which plants can use.
