You will be required to take the UCLA Extension Calculus Placement Exam if you wish to enroll in any of the following courses:

- Math XL 31A (Calculus I)
- Math XL 31B (Calculus II)
- Math XL 31C (Calculus III)

Students who have already completed a college-level calculus course with a grade of C or better elsewhere may be exempt. However, if you are unsure about your math background or if it has been more than two years since your last math class, taking the placement exam is strongly recommended—even if

you think you might qualify for an exemption.

Exam Format and Content

The UCLA Extension Calculus Placement Exam is a timed, proctored test lasting approximately 90 minutes. It is typically administered remotely using a proctoring service, although in-person options may be available on request. The exam is closed-book and no calculators are allowed, so mental arithmetic and algebraic manipulation skills are critical.

Topics Covered

The exam focuses on precalculus material—the mathematical building blocks needed for success in calculus. Here is a breakdown of the major areas:

- **Algebraic Manipulations:** Simplifying expressions, factoring, solving equations and inequalities, working with exponents and radicals.
- **Functions and Their Properties:** Domain and range, composite and inverse functions, transformations of graphs, even and odd functions.

The exam does not require any calculus knowledge—its sole purpose is to verify that you can handle algebraic and trigonometric manipulations at a speed and accuracy needed for calculus.

How to Register for the UCLA Extension Calculus Placement Exam

Registration is handled entirely through UCLA Extension's online portal. Here is a step-by-step guide:

1. **Create or log in** to your UCLA Extension student account.
2. **Navigate to the placement exam page** under the Math & Statistics department.
3. **Select a test date** from the available options. Dates are offered regularly throughout the year, but slots fill quickly, especially before fall and spring quarters.
4. **Pay the exam fee** (currently around \$50–\$75, though subject to change).
5. **Complete the remote proctoring setup** if testing from home. You will receive instructions for installing the proctoring software and checking your system requirements.

After registration, you will receive a confirmation email with details about the test day, including technical requirements and allowed materials (which are very few).

Understanding Your Score and Next Steps

Results are typically available within one to two weeks after the test date. You will receive a score report that indicates your recommended placement. The report does not provide a numerical score but rather a placement decision:

- **Placement into Calculus I (Math XL 31A):** You demonstrated strong precalculus skills and can proceed directly to calculus.
- **Placement into Precalculus or Algebra Review:** You need to strengthen your foundations before attempting calculus. UCLA Extension offers courses like Math XL 1 (College Algebra) and Math XL 2 (Precalculus).

If you do not place into Calculus I, do not be discouraged. Many students start in precalculus and still go on to succeed in calculus. Taking the prerequisite course is far better than struggling

through calculus and failing.

Can You Retake the Exam?

Yes, you are allowed to retake the UCLA Extension Calculus Placement Exam. However, there may be a waiting period of one quarter (about three months) and you must re-register and pay the fee again. Use the time between attempts to study the areas where you performed poorly.

Frequently Asked Questions

Does the exam assume knowledge of calculus?

No, the exam strictly covers precalculus. No derivative or integral calculations are required.

Is the exam equivalent to the AP Calculus AB/BC exam?

No, the placement exam is purely diagnostic. It does not grant college credit for calculus. AP exam scores (3 or higher) can be used for course equivalency at UCLA Extension, but the placement exam serves a different purpose.

What if I have already taken calculus before?

How long are my placement results valid?

Placement results are typically valid for one year from the test date. If you do not enroll in a calculus course within that year, you may need to retake the exam.
