- **Tire Rotation** – Rotating tires ensures even tread wear, extending tire life and improving ride quality. The pattern for the 2007 Camry is typically front-to-rear with a

side-to-side crossover.

- **Visual Inspection** – A thorough check of belts, hoses, fluid levels (coolant, brake fluid, transmission fluid, windshield washer), battery terminals, and the exhaust system.
- **Air Filter Check** – The engine air filter should be inspected and replaced if dirty. A clogged filter reduces performance and fuel economy.
- **Cabin Air Filter Replacement (if needed)** – This filter cleans the air entering the passenger compartment. It is often recommended every 15,000-20,000 miles, but should be checked at every 5,000-mile service, especially in dusty environments.

Tip: Many owners use synthetic oil, which offers longer protection. Even if you extend your oil change intervals to 7,500 or 10,000 miles, still perform the tire rotation and inspection at every 5,000 miles.

The 15,000-Mile and 30,000-Mile Services: Deeper Inspections

As your Camry accumulates miles, certain components require more focused attention. The 15,000-mile service builds on the 5,000-mile list, while the 30,000-mile service is a major milestone.

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15,000-Mile Service (or 18 months)

- All 5,000-mile items
- **Replace Engine Air Filter**
- **Replace Cabin Air Filter**
- **Inspect Drive Belts** (serpentine belt)
- **Inspect Brake Linings and Drums/Disks**
- **Inspect Steering, Suspension, and Drive Shaft Boots**
- **Tighten Bolts and Nuts on Chassis and Body**

30,000-Mile Service (or 36 months)

This is often referred to as a “major service.” It includes everything from the 15,000-mile service plus several critical replacements and inspections:

- **Replace Spark Plugs** (for 2.4L 4-cylinder engine – iridium plugs are often good for 120,000 miles; however, the 30k service includes inspection. For the V6, plugs are typically long-life but should be inspected.)
- **Replace Engine Coolant** (Toyota recommends using Genuine Toyota Super Long Life

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Coolant or a high-quality equivalent. Initial replacement at 30k miles or 3 years, then every 60k miles after.)

- **Replace Transmission Fluid** (for automatic transmissions. A simple drain and fill is often preferred over a power flush.)
- **Inspect Fuel Lines and Connections**
- **Inspect Exhaust System**
- **Inspect Brake Fluid and Clutch Fluid (if manual)**
- **Lubricate Lock Cylinders and Hinges**

The 60,000-Mile and 90,000-Mile Services: Key Milestones

At these intervals, your Camry's long-term durability components come into focus.

60,000-Mile Service (or 72 months)

- All 30,000-mile items
- **Replace Drive Belts** (serpentine belt)
- **Replace Brake Fluid** (every 60k miles or 6 years is a common recommendation)

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- **Inspect/Replace Automatic Transmission Fluid** (if not done at 30k)
- **Inspect Timing Chain/Serpentine Belt Tensioner** (the 2007 Camry uses a timing chain, not a belt, which is designed to last the life of the engine. However, the tensioner and related components should be inspected.)
- **Replace Engine Coolant** (if not done at 30k, this is the time)

90,000-Mile Service (or 108 months)

- All 60,000-mile items
- **Replace Spark Plugs** (for all engines, as per long-life recommendations)
- **Inspect PCV Valve** (replace if necessary)
- **Inspect/Replace Oxygen Sensors** (if check engine light indicates issues)
- **Thorough Inspection of Suspension Components** (shocks, struts, ball joints, control arm bushings)

Severe Driving: When to Service More Often

Toyota defines severe driving conditions as:

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- Short trips of less than 5 miles (or 10 miles in freezing temperatures).
- Extensive idling or low-speed driving (stop-and-go traffic).
- Driving on rough, muddy, or dusty roads.
- Using your Camry for towing or carrying heavy loads.
- Driving in extreme hot or cold climates.

If any of these apply to you, consider shortening the recommended intervals by half. For example, instead of changing oil every 5,000 miles, do it every 3,000 miles. Replace the engine air filter more frequently in dusty conditions.

Additional Maintenance Items to Remember

Battery and Charging System

Batteries typically last 3-5 years. Have the battery and alternator tested at every oil change. Clean corrosion from terminals with a baking soda solution.

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Tires

Check tire pressure monthly, including the spare. Rotate tires every 5,000 miles. Replace tires when tread depth reaches 4/32 of an inch for safe wet weather performance. All-season tires are standard, but consider winter tires if you live in snowy areas.

Brakes

Listen for squeaking, grinding, or vibration. Have brake pads and rotors inspected at every 15,000-mile service. Brake fluid should be flushed every 60,000 miles to prevent moisture absorption and corrosion.

Cooling System

Check the coolant level in the reservoir regularly. Inspect hoses for cracks or bulges. Flush and replace coolant according to the schedule (every 30k or 60k miles depending on fluid type).

Transmission

Automatic transmission fluid (ATF) should be checked while the engine is running and at operating temperature. Use only Toyota World Standard (WS) ATF for the 2007 Camry. Overfilling can cause damage, so precise measurement is crucial.

DIY vs. Professional Service

Cost of Ownership and Recommended Parts

The 2007 Toyota Camry is one of the least expensive vehicles to maintain. Budget approximately:

- \$40-60 for a basic oil change (DIY \$20-30)
- \$100-150 for a 30,000-mile service (DIY parts cost \$50-70)
- \$300-400 for a 60,000-mile service (including transmission fluid, coolant, brake fluid, belts)

- \$500-700 for a 90,000-mile service (spark plugs, belts, fluids, inspection)

Use high-quality aftermarket brands like Aisin (original equipment manufacturer for many Toyota parts), NGK or Denso for spark plugs, and Valvoline or Mobil 1 for fluids. Filter brands: Toyota Genuine or Wix.
