Activities and Games for Your Go Dog Go Dog Party

Pin the Hat on the Dog

A twist on the classic "Pin the Tail on the Donkey." Draw or print a large dog (similar to the book's style) and attach it to the wall. Create party hat cutouts with double-sided tape. Blindfold each child, spin them gently, and let them try to place the hat on the dog's head. Use the phrase "Do you like my hat?" as a fun prompt.

Storytime and Puppet Show

Read *Go, Dog. Go!* aloud to the group, using enthusiastic voices and encouraging kids to join in on the repeated phrases like "Go, dog, go!" and "Stop that dog!" After reading, you can use simple dog puppets (sock puppets or paper bag puppets) to reenact the story. Let the children take turns being the dogs.

"Go" Cupcakes

Bake cupcakes and frost them with a simple buttercream. Top each with a small toy car or a dog ring. Write "Go!" on edible paper or with icing. Alternatively, make a large sheet cake decorated like a road with toy cars and dog figures.

Colorful Drinks

Offer drinks in the four theme colors: fruit punch (red), blue sports drink (blue), lemonade (yellow), and limeade (green). Add silly labels like "Dog Punch" or "Go Juice." Use color-coordinated cups.

Invitations and Party Favors

Set the tone with invitations that mimic the book's art style. Use bright primary colors and simple drawings of dogs in cars. Write text like "You're invited to a Go Dog Go Dog Party! Come wear your favorite hat and get ready to play!" You can send digital invites or handmade cards.
