Some local union chapters choose to include a mechanical aptitude section. This part tests your understanding of basic physical principles. You may be asked about:

- **Pulleys and levers**
- **Gears** and direction of rotation
- **Simple machines**
- **Basic physics concepts** like force, pressure, and velocity

Even if your local chapter does not include this, understanding basic mechanics is beneficial for the trade.

Strategies for a Stellar Score: How to Prepare

You cannot walk into the Electrical Apprentice Aptitude Test and wing it. Preparation is non-negotiable. Here is a step-by-step plan to help you prepare effectively.

Step 1: Know Your Timeline
