Why Is Regulus Called R.A.B. and Not R.B.?

One question that arises is why Regulus used his middle initial. The answer lies in his name: **Regulus Arcturus Black**. “Arcturus” is a star and the name of his grandfather, a respected pure-blood wizard. The Black family tradition involved naming children after stars and constellations—Regulus is the name of the brightest star in the constellation Leo.
