3. The Iron Cage: A Bad Day at the Office.

The Iron Cage incident is a pivotal moment in Iron Warriors lore. After the Horus Heresy, Rogal Dorn attempted to destroy the remnants of the Iron Warriors once and for all. Instead, Perturabo lured Dorn into a trap, resulting in a brutal stalemate that nearly broke the Imperial Fists. On 1d4chan, this event is described less as a grand military victory and more as Perturabo finally getting a chance to yell "I told you so!" at his brother. The 1d4chan version of Perturabo has become a cult classic for a reason. It taps into a universal human experience: the feeling of being underappreciated. Everyone has had a boss who took credit for their work, or a peer who got praise for a lesser effort. Perturabo is the ultimate embodiment of that resentment. The 1d4chan page validates that feeling in a humorous, over-the-top way.

Relatability Through Exaggeration.

The official lore makes Perturabo a tragic figure, but a distant one. He is a demigod capable of breaking planets. The 1d4chan version brings him down to earth.
