- on: **A** (Left hand thumb and fingers 1 covering the top hole)
- his: **G**
- farm: **G**
- he: **A**
- had: **B**
- a: **B**
- cow: **B**

Phrase 4: "E-I-E-I-O"

- E: **G**
- I: **G**
- E: **G**
- I: **D**
- O: **G**

Phrase 5: "With a moo-moo here, and a moo-moo there"

- With: **B**
- a: **A**
- moo: **G**
- moo: **G**
- here: **D**
- and: **B**
- a: **A**
- moo: **G**
- moo: **G**
- there: **D**

Phrase 6: "Here a moo, there a moo, everywhere a moo-

moo"

- Here: **B**
- a: **A**
- moo: **G**
- there: **B**
- a: **A**
- moo: **G**
- ev: **G**
- ery: **G**
- where: **D**
- a: **B**
- moo: **A**
- moo: **G** (Then repeat the "E-I-E-I-O" phrase to finish the verse)

Final Phrase 7: "E-I-E-I-O"

- E: **G**
- I: **G**
- E: **G**
- I: **D**
- O: **G**

This sequence of **notes for Old MacDonald Had a Farm on recorder** repeats for each verse, with different animal sounds substituted. The melody remains the same regardless of whether the animal is a cow, pig, duck, or horse. This repetition is excellent for building fluency and confidence.

Detailed Fingering Chart for the Notes Used

To play the **notes for Old MacDonald Had a Farm on recorder** correctly, you must know the precise finger placement. Here is a breakdown for each note in the song.

Note: G (Low G)

- **Left Hand:** Thumb covers the thumb hole on the back. First finger covers the first hole (top front). Second finger covers the second hole. Third finger covers the third hole.

Note: A

Step-by-Step Practice Guide

Knowing the **notes for Old MacDonald Had a Farm on recorder** on paper is only the beginning. The real magic happens when you translate that knowledge into sound. Here is a structured practice routine to help you succeed.

Step 1: Master the Individual Notes

Once this pattern feels smooth, you have mastered the core rhythmic motif of the song.

Step 3: Small Phrases, Not the Whole Song

Do not try to play the entire song from start to finish immediately. Break it down into the phrases we outlined earlier. Practice "Old MacDonald had a farm" (G-G-G-D-D-D-G) until you can play it without hesitation. Then practice "E-I-E-I-O" separately. Then combine them.
