Cox typically markets its mid-level packages under names like "Contour Preferred" or "Contour TV." This is where the lineup expands significantly. You will find a wealth of entertainment, news, and lifestyle channels, including HGTV, Food Network, Discovery Channel, National Geographic, and BBC America. The **Cox Channel Guide New Orleans** for this tier also includes a robust selection of channels for children (Nickelodeon, Disney Channel, Cartoon Network) and music channels (MTV, CMT, BET).

At the top of the lineup are the premium movie channels. Cox subscribers in New Orleans can add HBO, Showtime, Starz, Cinemax, and The Movie Channel. These are typically found in the 300 to 400 channel range. It is important to check your specific guide, as Cox occasionally moves these channels to make room for new additions like MGM+ or streaming content insertions.

You can find WWL-TV's dedicated cable channel, which provides non-stop news and weather, separate from its main broadcast feed. Additionally, you will find **NOLA.com | The Times-Picayune** content integrated into the on-demand section of your guide, offering video articles and interviews with local journalists.

Sports in the Big Easy

New Orleans is a passionate sports town, and the Cox lineup reflects that. The most critical channel for local fans is **Bally Sports New Orleans** (formerly Fox Sports New Orleans). This is your home for New Orleans Pelicans basketball, as well as extensive coverage of LSU Tigers athletics. Finding this channel is a top priority for many subscribers. In most versions of the **Cox Channel Guide New Orleans**, Bally Sports New Orleans is located in the 30s or 40s range, but you should verify using the interactive guide on your remote, as channel numbers can change with carriage disputes or contract renewals.

Beyond the regional network, the guide includes all the major sports networks like ESPN (multiples), NFL Network, MLB Network, NBA TV, and NHL Network. Cox also often carries a "Sports & Info" channel that provides real-time scores and tickers, perfect for keeping up during football season.

Cultural and Community Channels

No guide for New Orleans would be complete without mentioning channels dedicated to the arts and culture of the region. **WYES (PBS 12)** is a local treasure, offering programming that ranges from classic British dramas to locally produced documentaries about Mardi Gras, the Mississippi River, and Louisiana history. Additionally, Cox sometimes includes a local access channel that broadcasts city council meetings, school board sessions, and other community events.

How to Use the Interactive Cox Channel Guide

Gone are the days of scrolling through a static menu. Modern Cox subscribers in New Orleans have access to a powerful interactive guide. This feature is your best tool for finding what to watch, setting recordings, and discovering new content.

Navigating with Your Remote

The most basic way to access the guide is by pressing the **"Guide"** button on your Cox remote control. This will bring up a grid of channels. You can scroll up and down to see different channels or use the **"Page Up"** and **"Page Down"** buttons to jump through the list quickly. If you are looking for a specific channel by name, press the **"A"** or **"Search"** button (depending on your remote model) to bring up a search function. To do this, open the guide, highlight a channel, and press the **"OK"** or **"Select"** button. Look for an option that says "Add to Favorites" or a star icon. Common Channel Ranges in New Orleans

- Channels 500+:** On-demand content, pay-per-view events, and music channels.

On-Demand and Streaming Integration
