How to Enable Macros in Excel: Step-by-Step Methods

Method 1: Enable Macros via the Message Bar

The simplest way to enable macros is through the message bar that appears when you open a macro-enabled workbook.

Method 2: Enable Macros Through the Trust Center

1. Open Excel and go to **File > Options**.
2. In the Excel Options dialog, select **Trust Center** from the left panel.
3. Click the **Trust Center Settings** button.
4. Choose **Macro Settings** from the left panel.
5. Select one of the following options:
 - **Disable all macros without notification** – Macros never run, and you are not notified. This is the most secure setting.
 - **Disable all macros with notification** – Macros are disabled, but you are prompted to enable them when opening a file. This is the default and recommended setting.
 - **Disable all macros except digitally signed macros** – Only macros signed by a trusted publisher will run. Others are disabled.
 - **Enable all macros (not recommended, potentially dangerous code can run)** – All macros run without prompting. Use this only if you are certain all files are safe.
6. Click **OK** to close the Trust Center, then **OK** again to close Excel Options.

For most users, the recommended setting is **Disable all macros with notification**. This gives you control while keeping security risks low.

Method 3: Enable Macros by Saving to a Trusted Location

If you work with macros regularly, consider saving your macro-enabled workbooks in a **Trusted Location**. Files in trusted locations run macros automatically, without any security warnings.

1. Go to **File > Options > Trust Center**.
2. Click **Trust Center Settings**.
3. Select **Trusted Locations** from the left panel.
4. Click **Add new location**.
5. Browse to the folder where you store macro-enabled files, or type the path.
6. Optionally, check **Subfolders of this location are also trusted** if needed.
7. Click **OK** to confirm.

Now any macro-enabled workbook placed in that folder will run macros without prompting. This is a convenient method for users who maintain a library of trusted automation tools.

Method 4: Enable Macros for a Single Session Using VBA

Advanced users can enable macros programmatically using VBA itself. This method is useful when you need to run a macro from another macro or when building automated workflows.

1. Open the VBA editor by pressing **Alt + F11**.
2. In the Immediate Window, type `Application.AutomationSecurity = msoAutomationSecurityLow` and press Enter.
3. You can now run macros from that session without prompts.

Note that this method should be used with caution, as it lowers security for the entire Excel application session.

How to Enable Macros in Excel for a Specific Workbook

Sometimes you only want to enable macros for one workbook, not all of them. The message bar method described earlier is perfect for this. Alternatively, you can save the workbook as a **macro-enabled workbook (.xlsm)** and then apply the **Enable Content** action. This approach keeps other workbooks protected.

Another way to enable macros for a single workbook is through the **File > Info** menu. When you open a file with macros, the Info page will show a warning. Click **Enable Content** from that panel instead of the message bar.

Security Best Practices When Enabling Macros

While learning how to enable macros in Excel is important, doing so safely is even more critical. Follow these best practices to minimize risk:

- **Only enable macros from trusted sources.** If you receive an Excel file from an unknown sender, verify the source before enabling macros.

- **Keep your antivirus software updated.** Modern antivirus programs can detect malicious macros before they execute.

File Is Not Macro-Enabled (.xlsx)

A common mistake is trying to enable macros in a file saved as **.xlsx**. Such files cannot contain macros. Save the file as **.xlsm** or **.xlsb** to preserve the VBA code. Go to **File > Save As** and choose **Excel Macro-Enabled Workbook** from the file type dropdown.

Visual Basic for Applications Is Not Installed

If Excel cannot run macros, VBA may not be installed. Re-run the Office installation and ensure VBA is included. This usually happens with certain volume license editions or minimalist installations.

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Enabling Macros in Different Versions of Excel

The steps for how to enable macros in Excel are largely consistent across versions, but there are minor differences.

- **Excel 2010, 2013, 2016, 2019, and Office 365** – All use the Trust Center method described above. The message bar is available in all these versions.
