M24 and M110 Sniper/Squad Designated Marksman Targets

For precision shooters, the targets are smaller and feature incredibly tight scoring rings. These targets demand exceptional accuracy. The qualification card for these weapons is meticulously scrutinized, as sniper and SDM

qualifications are held to the highest standards.

Qualification Scoring and Standards
