As of March 2025, the OED Online contains well over 600,000 entries and is expanding every three months. Because it is digital, its size is essentially unbounded by paper. Merriam-Webster Unabridged

Merriam-Webster’s flagship product, the *Merriam-Webster Unabridged*, is a popular American dictionary. It claims about 490,000 entries (including archaic and specialist terms), but many entries are less detailed than the OED. It does not trace a word’s history back to Old English with the same depth of quotation. Nevertheless, it is the largest single-volume English dictionary in print, with a heavy 2,800-page tome.

Collins English Dictionary

The *Collins English Dictionary* boasts around 725,000 words, definitions, and phrases. However, that number includes inflected forms and derived words. When counting headwords, Collins is smaller than the OED. Collins also has a strong focus on contemporary usage and technical terms.

Random House Webster’s Unabridged Dictionary

The *Random House Webster’s Unabridged Dictionary* (1997) contains about 315,000 entries. It is a respected American reference but again does not match the OED’s historical depth.

In summary, while many dictionaries have large word counts, no

other work dedicates so much space per entry to etymology, pronunciation, variant forms, and—most crucially—quotations showing the word’s evolution across centuries. This comprehensive approach is what cements the OED’s reputation as the **largest English dictionary in the world**.

The dictionary aims to reflect the global nature of the language, making it even more comprehensive.

The Digital Evolution: How the Largest Dictionary Stays Current

Print limitations once meant that a dictionary could only be updated with new editions every few decades. The OED’s move to an online platform changed everything. Subscribers can access the full OED3 content, which is revised quarterly. The digital version also allows for advanced search functions, such as finding all words that entered English from a particular language (e.g., French loanwords) or words first used in a specific decade. There are also pronunciation audio files and links to the Historical Thesaurus of the Oxford English Dictionary. Because it is digital, the dictionary can be genuinely “largest” without the physical constraints of paper. It continues to absorb new words from

science, technology, pop culture, and social media.

Challenges of Maintaining the Largest English Dictionary
