While a normal belly button is just a harmless scar, there are times when the area around the navel can signal a health issue. The most common condition is an umbilical hernia. This is especially frequent in puppies and kittens. An umbilical hernia feels like a small, soft, squishy lump at the site of the belly button. It occurs when the abdominal muscles do not close completely after birth, allowing abdominal contents to push through. Small hernias often close on their own within a few months, but larger ones may require surgery. Another issue to watch for is infection. If the umbilical cord stump does not dry properly in a newborn, or if the mother is not diligent about cleaning, an infection (omphalitis) can develop. This looks like redness, swelling, or discharge around the navel. In very rare cases, a tumor can form at the umbilical site. If you notice any new lump, redness, or your pet licking the area excessively, it is always wise to consult a veterinarian.
