Transfer Purchases from iPhone to iTunes

1. Connect your iPhone to your computer using a USB cable.
2. Open iTunes (or the Music app on macOS Catalina and later).

3. Click the device icon that appears near the top-left corner.
4. Under the **Summary** tab, look for the **Options** section.
5. Check the box labeled "**Manually manage music and videos**".
6. Right-click your device name and select "**Transfer Purchases**".

This action copies all purchased music, apps, and books from your iPhone back to the iTunes library on your computer. It is a one-way street, however, and does not cover songs you obtained outside the iTunes ecosystem.

Limitations of Native iTunes Transfer

While the official method works for paid content, it fails when you need to move ripped MP3s, downloaded tracks from other services, or recordings made directly on the device. This is where many users become frustrated and search for alternative answers to **how to transfer songs from iPhone to iTunes** that covers all file types.

Method 2: Using iCloud and iTunes Match (The Wireless Approach)

Apple offers a subscription-based service called iTunes Match (now bundled with Apple Music) that can help synchronize your library across devices without a cable. However, it is not a direct transfer tool—it matches your tracks with Apple's catalog and makes them available everywhere.

How iTunes Match Works

- Subscribing to Apple Music or iTunes Match enables iCloud

Music Library.

- Songs on your iPhone are scanned and matched against Apple's database.
- Matched tracks are made available for download on your computer's iTunes.
- Unmatched tracks (rare or obscure recordings) are uploaded to iCloud and then downloaded to your PC.

Steps to enable iCloud Music Library:

1. On your iPhone, go to **Settings > Music**.
2. Toggle on "**Sync Library**" (iOS 14.6 and later).
3. On your computer, open iTunes Preferences (Windows) or Music Preferences (Mac).
4. Check "**Sync Library**" under the General tab.
5. Wait for the devices to synchronize. Downloaded songs should appear in your library.

This method is elegant but requires an ongoing subscription. If you are looking for a free, one-time solution for **how to transfer songs from iPhone to iTunes**, this may not be the ideal path.

Method 3: Using Third-Party Software (Most Comprehensive)

When native tools fall short, dedicated third-party applications step in. These programs are designed specifically to bridge the gap between iOS devices and computer libraries. They offer more flexibility, allowing you to select individual tracks, playlists, or entire

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libraries for transfer.

Top Tools for Transferring Music

1. iMazing

iMazing is a powerful, user-friendly alternative to iTunes. It allows you to browse your iPhone's file system and drag music directly to your computer's hard drive or iTunes library. The free version offers limited transfers, but the paid version unlocks full functionality.

- **Pros:** No subscription required; supports selective transfer; works with voice memos and other audio files.
- **Cons:** The full version costs money; requires installation.

2. Senuti (iTunes spelled backward)

A classic tool that many Mac users rely on. Senuti reads the iPhone's music database and copies songs into iTunes. It is simple, focused, and effective.

- **Pros:** Purpose-built for this exact task; minimal interface.
- **Cons:** Mac only; limited updates in recent years.

3. Syncios

A cross-platform tool that supports both Windows and Mac. Syncios offers a free mode for transferring a limited number of files, with a paid version for unlimited use.

- **Pros:** Affordable; supports video and photo transfer as well.
- **Cons:** Free version is restrictive; occasional compatibility issues with new iOS versions.

4. AnyTrans

A comprehensive iOS manager that handles music, messages, photos, and

more. Its music transfer feature allows direct migration from iPhone to iTunes with a single click.

- **Pros:** All-in-one solution; intuitive design.
- **Cons:** Premium pricing; some features require internet connection.

Using any of these tools, the general workflow for **how to transfer songs from iPhone to iTunes** involves connecting your device, launching the software, selecting the music you want, and choosing "Export to iTunes" or "Copy to Computer."

Step-by-Step Example Using iMazing

1. Download and install iMazing on your computer.
2. Connect your iPhone via USB or Wi-Fi.
3. In iMazing, click on **"Music"** under your device.
4. Browse the songs on your iPhone. Select the ones you wish to transfer.
5. Click **"Export to iTunes"** from the toolbar.
6. Choose whether to copy the files to an existing playlist or create a new one.
7. Open iTunes; your songs should appear in the library immediately.

This method bypasses nearly all restrictions and works with every audio file format, including MP3, AAC, WAV, and FLAC.

Method 4: Manual File

Memos and Other Explorer (For Advanced Users)

If you are using a Windows PC and have enabled disk use mode in iTunes, you can sometimes access the iPhone's file system directly. This method is less reliable in recent iOS versions but remains an option for older devices or jailbroken phones.

Steps for Manual Transfer

1. Connect your iPhone to the PC.
2. Open iTunes and enable **"Manually manage music and videos"** under the Summary tab.
3. Minimize iTunes. Open **File Explorer**.
4. Look for your iPhone under **"This PC"**. It may appear as a portable device.
5. Double-click the internal storage and navigate to **Internal Storage > Apple Media Services > Music**.
6. You may see folders with cryptic names. Copy these folders to your desktop.
7. Rename the files with .m4a or .mp3 extensions as needed and drag them into iTunes.

Important Caveat: This method is not officially supported and may not work on newer iOS versions due to enhanced security measures. It also requires locating and renaming files, which can be tedious for large libraries.

Method 5: Using Voice

Transferring Voice Memos via iTunes

A common scenario involves transferring voice memos, live recordings, or audio notes from the iPhone to iTunes. These files are stored separately from purchased music and require a slightly different approach.

Transferring Voice Memos via iTunes

1. Connect your iPhone to your computer.
2. Open iTunes and select your device.
3. Click on **Music** in the sidebar (not the library).
4. Check the box **"Include voice memos"** under Sync Settings.
5. Apply the sync. The voice memos will be added to a playlist named "Voice Memos" in iTunes.

Alternative Method: You can also share voice memos via email, AirDrop, or cloud storage, then manually add them to iTunes. This is simpler for individual files.

Common Issues and Troubleshooting

Even with clear instructions, problems can arise. Here are frequent stumbling blocks and how to resolve them when attempting **how to transfer songs from iPhone to iTunes**.

iTunes Does Not Recognize the Device

- Update iTunes to the latest version.

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- Restart both the iPhone and the computer.
- Try a different USB cable or port.
- Check for driver issues in Windows Device Manager.

Songs Are Grayed Out or Cannot Be Played

- This often occurs with DRM-protected content. Only songs purchased from iTunes or ripped from CDs are transferable via standard methods.
- Third-party software may strip DRM, but check local laws regarding digital rights.

Transfer Stops Midway

- Ensure your iPhone is unlocked and the screen does not turn off.
- Disable iCloud Music Library temporarily during the transfer to avoid conflicts.
- Use a wired connection instead of Wi-Fi for greater stability.

Missing Metadata or Album Artwork

- After importing songs into iTunes, select all tracks and choose **File > Library > Get Album Artwork**.
- Manually edit song information if necessary using the **Get Info**

option.
