

Kitchenaid Dishwasher Installation Instructions

Safety First

Turn off the power at the circuit breaker for the dishwasher circuit. Shut off the water supply under the sink. Verify the power is off by testing the circuit with a non-contact voltage tester. Keep work area dry and well-lit.

Step-by-Step Kitchenaid Dishwasher Installation Guide

Follow these steps in order. Each section corresponds to a critical part of the setup. Always refer to your specific model's manual, as some details vary slightly—but these general instructions apply to virtually all Kitchenaid dishwashers.

1. Prepare the Undercounter Space

Remove the old dishwasher if applicable. Disconnect the water line, drain hose, and electrical connections. Pull the old unit forward, remove it, and clean any debris or old putty from the floor. Measure the opening: it should be at least 24 inches wide, 24 inches deep, and 34 to 35 inches high (depending on leveling

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legs). If your countertop is stone, verify there is no overhang preventing the dishwasher from sliding in.

Install the water supply line. Use a 3/4-inch compression fitting to connect to the shutoff valve. Tighten with a wrench, but do not overtighten—hand tight plus a quarter turn is usually enough. Place the drain hose in a loop as close to the top of the sink base cabinet as possible (check local codes for high-drain loop requirements).

2. Connect the Water Supply Line

Most Kitchenaid dishwashers use a 1/2-inch female compression connection. Wrap Teflon tape around the threads of the shutoff valve. Attach the supply line and tighten securely. For stainless steel braided hoses, avoid kinking. After attaching, open the shutoff valve for a moment to flush any debris into a bucket, then close it again.

3. Install the Drain Hose

Attach the drain hose to the dishwasher's drain outlet. Use a hose clamp from the installation kit. Route the hose to the sink drain or garbage disposal. If using a disposal, you'll need to knock out the plug with a screwdriver. Connect the hose to the disposal inlet and secure with a hose clamp. Ensure the drain hose runs in a high loop under the sink to prevent backflow—this is a **critical step often overlooked** that leads to smelly standing water.

4. Electrical Connection (Hardwired or Plug-In)

Kitchenaid dishwashers are sold either with a power cord (3-prong plug) or for hardwiring. If your unit came without a cord, purchase an approved appliance cord with a grounding plug. Connect the wires inside the junction box: black to black (hot), white to white (neutral), and green or bare to green (ground). Use wire nuts and secure all connections with electrical tape. For hardwired installations, follow your local electrical code—often you must use a metal conduit and connect the ground wire to the dishwasher frame.

5. Position and Level the Dishwasher

With a helper, slide the dishwasher into the opening carefully. Pull the drain and supply lines through the cabinet hole. Avoid pinching them. Place a level on the top rack track and adjust the front legs using a screwdriver or wrench until the unit is perfectly level side-to-side and front-to-back. A dishwasher that is not level may leak and cause poor cleaning performance. Once level, adjust the rear legs using the hex nut accessible from inside the tub (some models

require removing the kickplate).

6. Secure the Dishwasher to the Countertop or Cabinet

Locate the mounting brackets. Most Kitchenaid models use two L-shaped brackets that attach to the top of the dishwasher frame. Screw them into the underside of a wooden countertop. If you have a granite or quartz countertop, use the side tabs instead to secure the dishwasher to the adjacent cabinet faces. Drill pilot holes into the cabinet frames to prevent splitting. Tighten all screws, but do not overtighten—you might crack the countertop or cabinet.

7. Reconnect Water and Power, and Test

Open the water supply valve fully. Check all connections for drips. Turn the power back on at the breaker. Run a “test cycle” or “rinse only” cycle without dishes. Listen for unusual noises, check for leaks under the sink and at the dishwasher base, and ensure the door closes and seals properly. If you notice any water on the floor, tighten connections or reapply Teflon tape. A successful test cycle is your final confirmation that the installation is correct.

Common Mistakes to Avoid During Kitchenaid Installation

Even experienced DIYers make errors. Here are the most frequent pitfalls:

- **Forgetting to remove the protective tape or foam blocks** from the spray arms and filters. These are factory-installed for shipping and must be taken out before first use.
- **Overtightening the drain hose clamp**—this can crack the plastic fitting. Snug is enough.
- **Leaving the dishwasher unleveled.** This causes water to pool in the bottom, leading to mold and poor washing.
- **Ignoring the high drain loop requirement.** Without a high loop, dirty sink water can siphon back into the dishwasher.
- **Not installing a water hammer arrestor** on the supply line if your home has fast-closing valves. If you hear banging, add one.
- **Failing to trim the anti-tip bracket** for hard floors. Kitchenaid dishwashers include an anti-tip bracket that must be anchored into the floor or wall to prevent tipping when the door is opened.

Troubleshooting Post-Installation Issues

If your Kitchenaid dishwasher does not operate correctly after installation, try these quick fixes before calling for service:

- **Does not start:** Check that the door is fully latched. Ensure the control panel is not in “locked” mode. Confirm the circuit breaker is on.
- **No water or slow fill:** Verify the water supply valve is open. Inspect the supply line for kinks. Clean the inlet screen (small mesh screen at the dishwasher connection).
- **Drainage problems:** Make sure the drain hose is not clogged or pinched. Confirm the high loop is at least 30 inches above the floor. Check the garbage disposal plug is removed (if applicable).
- **Leaks from the front:** The door seal may be misaligned. Open the door and inspect the gasket—it should sit evenly. The dishwasher might be overfilled due to a faulty fill valve, but first check for leveling issues.
- **Excessive noise:** Foreign objects (like screws or utensils left from installation) can get caught in the impeller. Remove any debris from the sump area.

When to Call a Professional for Kitchenaid Dishwasher Installation
