Introduction to the Vista 20p Programming Guide

The Honeywell Vista 20p is one of the most widely used alarm control panels in the security industry. Entering Programming Mode on the Vista 20p

If you have trouble entering programming mode, double-check that the panel is powered on and that no zones are faulted. Some systems may also have a lockout feature if the wrong code is entered too many times. Once you are in, you can begin navigating the various programming fields.

Navigating Programming

Fields and Data

Once inside programming mode, the Vista 20p uses a system of numbered fields. Each field controls a specific aspect of the system, such as zone types, communication options, or user codes. To move between fields, you typically use the [#] key to advance to the next field. To enter a specific field directly, you can key in the field number and then press [*]. For example, entering [*][56] would take you to field 56, which often deals with zone programming. It is important to understand that each field may contain a single digit, a multi-digit number, or a series of entries. Programming Zones on the Vista 20p

- **Zone Type 16:** Panic - For 24-hour emergency buttons.

To program a zone, you will enter the zone number and then assign the appropriate type. For example, to make zone 1 a perimeter door, you would navigate to the zone programming section and enter 01. Always verify that the zone type matches the sensor location and intended use.

Zone Attributes and Response

Beyond the zone type, you may also need to set zone attributes. These define things like whether the zone is normally open or normally closed, how much response time it should have, and whether it can be bypassed. Most modern wired sensors use normally closed loops, but wireless sensors may have different configurations. The Vista 20p programming guide will list specific fields for these details, often found in fields 20 through 29 for zones 1 through 8.

Configuring User Codes

User codes allow authorized people to arm and disarm the system. The Vista 20p supports up to 50 user codes, each with its own unique number. The default master user code is typically 1234, but you should change this immediately for security reasons.

To program a new user code:

1. Enter programming mode as described earlier.
2. Navigate to the user code field, often field 30 for user 1.
3. Enter the new four-digit code. For longer codes, the system may accept six digits depending on your configuration.
4. Press [*] to save the code and move to the next user.

You can also assign different authority

levels to users, such as "Master," "Manager," or "Operator." These levels control whether a user can change other users' codes or access certain system features. Refer to your Vista 20p programming guide for the exact field numbers and authority options.

Setting System Parameters and Timers

The Vista 20p offers numerous system parameters that affect how the alarm operates day to day. These include entry and exit delays, alarm duration, and communication settings. Getting these right is crucial for a system that is both secure and convenient.

Exit Delay

This is the time you have to leave the building after arming the system. It is typically set between 30 and 60 seconds. To adjust it, you would enter field 40 and input the desired delay in seconds. For example, entering 045 would give you a 45-second exit delay.

Entry Delay

This is the time you have to enter the building and disarm the system before an alarm occurs. It is usually set to 15 to 30 seconds. Field 41 controls this parameter, and you enter the delay in seconds as well. A common setting is 030 for 30 seconds.

Alarm Duration

How long does the siren sound when an alarm is triggered? The default is often 4 minutes, but you can adjust this in field 20 or a related field. Some installers prefer 1 minute to avoid nuisance issues, while others use 4 minutes for maximum deterrence.

Communicator and Reporting Programming

For the system to call a central monitoring station or your phone, you must program the communicator settings. This is one of the more complex parts of the Vista 20p programming guide, but it is essential for systems that rely on monitoring.

You will need to enter the phone number for the central station in fields 41 and 42 for primary and backup numbers. You may also need to enter account numbers and communication formats. The most common format today is Contact ID, which is selected in field 46. If you are using a cellular communicator, you will also need to configure those settings through the communicator module itself.

Double-check that the dialing sequence is correct. The system typically uses tone dialing, but some older lines require pulse dialing. This is set in field 44. If you are using a VoIP line, you may need to add a pause or disable call waiting to ensure reliable communication.

Wireless Zone Programming

If your Vista 20p system includes wireless sensors, you will need to program them separately. This requires a wireless receiver, either built into the panel or as an add-on module (such as the 5881EN series). To enroll a wireless sensor, you must enter its serial number into the panel. This is typically done in fields 50 through 73, depending on the zone you are assigning.

Follow these general steps for wireless zone programming:

1. Enter programming mode.
2. Navigate to the wireless zone field for

- the zone you want to program.
3. Enter the sensor's serial number (usually an 8-digit number printed on the sensor).
 4. Assign the zone type and attributes as you would for a wired zone.
 5. Test the sensor by triggering it and verifying that the panel recognizes the signal.

Wireless zones are convenient but require careful placement to avoid interference. Always test the signal strength before finalizing the installation.

Testing and Finalizing Your Programming

After you have made all your changes, it is critical to test the system thoroughly. Exit programming mode by pressing [*][99] or simply turning the keypad off and on. Then, perform a walk test by arming the system and triggering each zone. Listen for the correct keypad beeps and ensure the siren sounds when expected.

Check that user codes work correctly for both arming and disarming. Also, verify that the communicator is sending signals to the monitoring station if applicable. A full test will confirm that your Vista 20p programming guide was followed correctly and that the system is ready for daily use.

Common Troubleshooting Tips

- **Cannot enter programming**

mode: Ensure the system is disarmed and that no zones are faulted. Try the default installer codes 4112, 4110, or 910.

- **User code not working:** Confirm the code was saved properly and that the user has the correct authority level.
