

How To Set Homepage In Chrome

On Android

- Open the Chrome app on your Android device.

On iOS (iPhone/iPad)

- Open Chrome on your iOS device.

- Tap the three-dot menu (bottom-right) and choose **Settings**.

- For startup behavior, go back to Settings and tap **Startup**. You can choose to open a new tab page, continue where you left off, or open specific pages. Add your desired URLs there.

Most issues are easy to fix. If you still face trouble, reset Chrome settings to default (Settings > Advanced > Reset and clean up > Restore settings to their original defaults). This will not remove bookmarks or passwords, but it will clear homepage settings. Then, follow the steps above again.
