- **B2: Dumbbell Romanian Deadlift (RDL)** – 3 sets of 10-12 reps. With a slight bend in your knees, push your hips back while lowering the dumbbells down your shins. Feel the stretch in your hamstrings. This is a phenomenal exercise for hamstring and glute health.

Superset 3: Shoulder and Core

- **C1: Seated Dumbbell Shoulder Press** – 3 sets of 8-10 reps. Press the dumbbells directly overhead from shoulder height. Do not arch your back excessively. This builds strong, healthy

shoulders.

- **C2: Dumbbell Russian Twists** – 3 sets of 12-15 reps per side. Sit with your feet off the floor (or on the floor for an easier version) and twist your torso side to side, holding a single dumbbell. This targets the obliques and deep core muscles.
