2. Real American Hero (RAH) - 3.75-Inch Figures (1982-1994)

- **1985:** A peak year with Crimson Guard, Snake Eyes (v2), and Flint. Crimson Guard (v1) (non-Tiger Force) can fetch \$30–\$60 loose. Snake Eyes v2 is iconic and typically \$50–\$100 loose.
- **1986:** Viper and Low-Light are standout figures. A complete Viper with both accessories can be \$30–\$50.
- **1987 and Beyond:** Figures from later years often have lower production runs but also lower demand. Still, the 1987 Cobra La and the 1988 Iron Grenadiers have niche value. The 1990s “Battle Corps” figures are less valuable, often under \$10–\$20 except for rare variants like the “Desert Sniper” or “Night Force” sub-line.

3. International and Regional Exclusives

One of the most exciting aspects of collecting G.I. Joe is the hunt for international figures. Hasbro released many figures in other countries that were not available in the U.S., often with different paint applications, card art, or even entirely unique characters. 4. 25th Anniversary & Modern Era (2007-2016)

Hasbro revived the 3.75-inch line with updated sculpts and articulation. These figures are still readily available, but some have appreciated. The 25th Anniversary single-carded figures originally retailed for about \$7; now, rare variants like “Comic Pack” exclusive figures or the “Ultimate Battle Pack” can be worth \$30–\$60 carded. The 50th Anniversary two-packs (2014) also have some gems, with figures like the “Gray Snake Eyes” or "Black Storm Shadow" fetching \$40–\$80.

5. G.I. Joe: Classified Series (6-Inch, 2020-Present)

The current premium line is the 6-inch Classified Series. While newer, certain figures have already become valuable due to scalping, limited releases (like Target or Amazon exclusives), and high demand. For example, the first Snake Eyes (v1) from the initial wave sold for \$40–\$60 at retail but can now be found for \$80–\$150 carded, while the Cobra Viper (Troop Builder) can command \$50–\$80.
