- Willie Christine King Farris (1927-2023):** The eldest child, Christine, became an educator and a civil rights activist. She taught at Spelman College for many years and served as a tireless keeper of her brother's legacy. - Alfred Daniel Williams King (1930-1969):** Known as A.D., he followed his father and brother into the Baptist ministry. Named after the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, where his father had served as pastor, Dexter Scott King was born in Atlanta. He served as chairman of The King Center at various times and was deeply involved in protecting his father's intellectual property and legacy. He passed away in January 2024 after a battle with prostate cancer.

Bernice Albertine King (born 1963)

The youngest child, Bernice Albertine King, was born in Atlanta. She was only five years old when her father was assassinated. Like her father and grandfather, Bernice became a Baptist minister. She is a powerful preacher in her own right and currently serves as the CEO of The King Center. She has focused much of her ministry on promoting nonviolence and healing racial divides.

The King children have faced the challenge of living under the shadow of an extraordinary legacy. While they have pursued different careers, each has contributed to keeping their father's dream alive in their own way.
