Step 1: Remove the Old Roofing (If Necessary)

Step 2: Install the Underlayment

Use a cap nailer or staples with plastic caps to secure it. In valleys and along eaves, install a self-adhering ice and water shield for extra protection against ice dams and heavy rain. Make sure the underlayment extends up and around all roof penetrations, such as vent pipes and chimneys. Trim it neatly and seal around penetrations with compatible tape or sealant.

Step 3: Install Drip Edge and Flashing

Drip edge is installed along the eaves and rake edges of the roof to direct water away from the fascia and into the gutters. Place the drip edge over the underlayment along the eaves, and under the underlayment along the rakes. Secure it with roofing nails every 12 inches. Next, install valley flashing in any roof valleys. Use pre-formed valley metal that matches your panel color and gauge. Center it in the valley and secure it on both sides, leaving the center free of fasteners to allow water to flow freely. Seal all seams and overlaps with sealant.

Step 4: Begin Installing Metal Panels

Start at the eave on the side of the roof opposite the prevailing wind. This prevents wind from driving rain under the panel overlaps. Align the first panel so it overhangs the eave by 1 to 1.5 inches. Snap a chalk line to ensure your first row is perfectly straight. For exposed fastener panels, drive screws through the raised ribs into the decking. Use a drill with a clutch to avoid over-tightening the screws, which can crush the neoprene washer and cause leaks. For standing seam panels, attach hidden clips to the deck, then snap the next panel onto the clip. This creates a clean, fastener-free surface. Continue installing panels across the roof, overlapping side laps according to the manufacturer's instructions. Typically, side laps are at least one rib wide and may require a bead of sealant for watertight integrity.

Step 5: Cut and Fit Around Obstacles

When you encounter a chimney, vent pipe, or skylight, measure carefully and cut the panel to fit. Use tin snips for small cuts or a circular saw with a metal blade for long straight cuts. Always wear eye protection when cutting metal. Cut panels slightly oversize and trim to fit precisely. Install flashing around each obstacle before securing the panel. For vent pipes, use a rubber boot or metal flashing cone. For chimneys, step flashing and counter-flashing are required. Seal all flashing edges with a high-quality polyurethane or butyl sealant.

Step 6: Install Ridge Cap and Trim

After all full panels are in place, install the ridge cap along the peak of the roof. Ridge caps cover the gap between panels on opposite sides of the roof and allow ventilation. Attach the ridge cap with screws on each side, but leave the top of the cap free of fasteners to prevent water entry. Use foam closure strips or ridge vent material underneath the cap to keep out insects and debris while allowing airflow. Install gable trim, rake trim, and any other finishing pieces according to the manufacturer's instructions. Seal all exposed screw heads with sealant or touch-up paint to prevent oxidation and leaks.
