DISARM (Destructive Imagery and Self-talk Awareness and Refusal Method)

This technique is designed to confront the persuasive voice that urges you to engage in addictive behavior. The handbook provides a step-by-step script: you visualize the urge as a separate entity, describe its appearance and voice, and then use
