12. Finally, curl the petals outward slightly using your fingers. Your simple origami tulip is complete!

Folding the Stem and Leaf

1. Take your green square of paper. Fold it in half diagonally to form a triangle.
2. Fold the triangle in half again to form a smaller triangle.
3. With the open edge facing upward, fold the right corner across to the left side, creating a stem shape.
4. Fold the top flap downward at an angle to create a leaf.
