Right side: $(\frac{2}{3})*16 + \frac{5}{6} = \frac{32}{3} + \frac{5}{6} = \frac{64}{6} + \frac{5}{6} = \frac{69}{6} = 11.5$
Both sides equal, so the solution is correct.

How to Effectively Use a Multi Step Equations With Fractions Worksheet
