Avoid high-impact or intense workouts when cramps are severe, as these may worsen symptoms for some individuals.

Massage and Acupressure

applying gentle pressure to specific acupressure points, such as the point about three finger-widths below the navel (CV6) or the inside of the ankle (SP6).
