The Golden Rule of Italian Pronunciation

- **Vowels are pure and clear.** *A* is like 'ah' (father), *E* is like 'eh' (bed), *I* is like 'ee' (see), *O* is like 'oh' (go), and *U* is like 'oo' (boot).
- **The letter 'C' can be hard or soft.** Before *A*, *O*, *U*, it is hard, like a 'k' (casa – KAH-zah). Before *E* or *I*, it is soft, like 'ch' (cena – CHEH-nah, ciao – CHOW).
- **The letter 'G' follows the same rule.** Before *A*, *O*, *U*, it is hard, like 'g' in 'go' (gatto – GAHT-toh). Before *E* or *I*, it is soft, like 'j' in 'jump' (gelato – JEH-lah-toh).
- **Double consonants are stressed.** Words like *pizza* (PEET-sah) and *anno* (AHN-noh, meaning year) require you to hold the consonant sound a bit longer. This is crucial for comprehension.
- **The 'R' is rolled.** Practice by placing your tongue near the roof of your mouth and vibrating it. A single 'r' is a light tap, while a double 'rr' is a more pronounced roll.

Greetings & Polite Essentials: Your First Step

These are the most fundamental **basic Italian phrases** you will use dozens of times a day. Mastering these is the single most effective way to improve your interactions.

- **Buongiorno (bwohn-JOHR-noh)** – Good morning / Good day. Used from morning until around lunchtime (or early afternoon).
- **Buon pomeriggio (bwohn poh-meh-REE-joh)** – Good afternoon. Used from around 2 PM to early evening, though *buongiorno* is often still acceptable. It is a bit more formal.
- **Buonasera (bwoh-nah-SEH-rah)** – Good evening. Used from late afternoon or early evening onwards. This is a common and warm greeting.
- **Buonanotte (bwoh-nah-NOHT-teh)** – Good night. Used when parting ways late at night or going to bed.
- **Ciao (CHOW)** – Hello / Goodbye (informal). Use this with friends, people your age, or in casual settings. Avoid it in formal situations or with older people you don't know.
- **Arrivederci (ah-ree-veh-DEHR-chee)** – Goodbye (formal). A courteous and standard way to say goodbye in shops, restaurants, and to people you don't know.
- **Per favore (pehr fah-VOH-reh)** – Please. An absolute must for any polite request.
- **Grazie (GRAH-tsee-eh)** – Thank you. Always say this with a smile.
- **Prego (PREH-goh)** – You're welcome / Please, after you. This versatile word is the standard reply to *grazie*.
- **Mi scusi (mee SKOO-zee)** – Excuse me (formal) / I'm sorry. Use this to get someone's attention, apologize for a bump, or ask for something.
- **Scusa (SKOO-zah)** – Excuse me / Sorry (informal). Use with people you know.
- **Perdono (pehr-DOH-noh) / Mi dispiace (mee dee-SPYAH-cheh)** – I'm sorry. Use *mi dispiace* when offering condolences or for more serious apologies. *Perdono* is for forgiveness.

- **Piacere (pyah-CHEH-reh)** – Pleased to meet you. A delightful phrase to use when being introduced.
- **Sì (see)** – Yes.
- **No (noh)** – No.

- **Vorrei prenotare una camera (vor-REH-ee preh-noh-TAH-reh OO-nah KAH-meh-rah)** – I would like to book a room.
- **Avete una camera libera? (ah-VEH-teh OO-nah KAH-meh-rah LEE-beh-rah?)** – Do you have a free room?

- **Ho una prenotazione (oh OO-nah preh-noh-tah-TSYOH-neh)** – I have a reservation.
- **La chiave, per favore (lah KYAH-veh, pehr fah-VOH-reh)** – The key, please.
- **Dov'è la colazione? (doh-VEH lah koh-lah-TSYOH-neh?)** – Where is breakfast?
- **Posso avere il conto? (POH-soh ah-VEH-reh eel KOHN-toh?)** – Can I have the bill?

- **Buonissimo! (bwoh-NEES-see-moh)** – Very delicious! A wonderful compliment to give the chef.
- **Salute! (sah-LOO-teh)** – Cheers! (To your health).
