- **Intermediate Restricted License (Class ILD):**

Available after holding the learner permit for 180 days, being at least 16 years old, completing

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a state-approved driver education course (or 50 hours of supervised driving practice, including 10 hours at night), and passing the road skills test. This license has driving restrictions: no driving between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. (except for work, school, or medical emergencies) and no more than one non-family passenger under 21 unless a licensed adult is present.

- **Full Unrestricted License (Class D):** Available at age 17 (or 18 without the intermediate step) if you have held the intermediate license for 12 months without any traffic

violations or convictions.

Key Tennessee Laws Every Permit Seeker Must Know

Tennessee has several unique laws that appear frequently on the knowledge test. Pay special attention to these:

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- **Hands-Free Law:**

Since 2019, Tennessee law prohibits holding a cell phone or electronic device while driving. This applies even when stopped at a red light. You can use hands-free features (Bluetooth, voice commands) but cannot physically hold the device. Violations can result in fines and even points on your license.

- **Move Over Law:**

When approaching a stationary emergency vehicle (police, fire, ambulance), tow truck, or highway maintenance vehicle with flashing lights on a multi-lane road, you must move over

to the lane farthest away. If you cannot safely move over, slow down to a reasonable speed. Violating this law is a Class A misdemeanor.

- **Seat Belt Law:**

Tennessee has a primary enforcement seat belt law—police can stop you solely for not wearing a seat belt. All occupants must be properly restrained, and the driver is responsible for everyone under 18. Adults can be fined \$50.

- **School Bus Stop**

Signs: When a school bus stops and extends its stop sign and flashing red lights, vehicles in both directions must stop (except on

divided highways with a median or barrier). Do not pass until the bus retracts the sign and turns off the lights.

- **Speed Limits:**

Unless otherwise posted, the maximum speed is: 70 mph on interstates, 65 mph on multi-lane divided highways, 55 mph on other highways, and 30 mph in urban or residential districts.

Memorizing these laws is essential for passing the written test and for becoming a safe driver. Include them in your Tennessee learners permit study guide flashcards.

Road Signs: The Language of the Road

You will be tested on your

ability to recognize and understand road signs by shape, color, and meaning. Here's a quick breakdown:

Defensive Driving and Safety Tips for the Written Test

A large portion of the knowledge test covers safe driving techniques. These are not just for the test—they will keep you alive on the road.

- **Following distance:**

Use the three-second rule under normal conditions. Choose a fixed object (like a sign) and when the car ahead passes it, count “one-thousand-one, one-thousand-two, one-thousand-three.” If you reach the object before you finish counting, you are following too closely.

- **Blind spots:** Check your mirrors and physically turn your head to check blind spots before changing lanes or merging.

- **Night driving:**

Reduce speed, increase following distance, and use high beams only when no oncoming traffic is within 500

feet and no vehicle ahead is within 200 feet.

- **Hydroplaning:** If your tires lose traction on wet roads, do not brake suddenly. Ease off the accelerator and steer straight until you regain control.
- **Skidding:** Steer in the direction you want the front of the car to go. Do not slam on brakes.

Also understand the concept of **defensive driving** – always being aware of your surroundings, anticipating hazards, and never assuming other drivers will do the right thing.

Alcohol, Drugs, and Driving: Zero

Tolerance for Under 21

Tennessee is strict about impaired driving, especially for young drivers. Know these facts:

- Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) limit for drivers 21 and older is 0.08%.
- For drivers under 21, the limit is 0.02%—essentially zero tolerance. Any detectable amount can lead to a license suspension.
- Implied consent: By driving in Tennessee, you automatically consent to a chemical test (breath, blood, or urine) if suspected of DUI. Refusal results in an automatic one-year suspension (first offense).

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- Consequences of DUI include fines, license suspension, possible jail time, mandatory substance abuse treatment, and ignition interlock device installation.

The written test will include multiple questions on the dangers of impaired driving and the legal consequences. Know the numbers and the laws.

How to Prepare for the Tennessee Knowledge Test

Read each question carefully—some are tricky with “all of the above” or “none of the above.” You may skip questions and return to them. You have a time limit, but it is usually generous (60 minutes). If you fail, you can retake the test the next day (some centers may require a waiting period of one day). You will need to pay a small testing fee each time.

Remember: the test is in English unless you request an interpreter (which must be arranged in advance). You are allowed to use the official manual only during the practice test? No, you cannot use any materials

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during the real test.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- Not studying the alcohol laws thoroughly – test questions frequently ask about BAC limits and implied consent.
- Mixing up signs – for example, a yellow yield sign is a mistake; yield signs are red and white triangles.
- Forgetting that seat belt laws apply to all seats, not just the front.
- Not reading the manual at all – relying solely on practice tests can miss nuances.
- Rushing through the

test – take your time; there is no prize for finishing first.
