7. Take the top point of the triangle on this side and fold it down towards the bottom edge. It should cover the pocket you just created on the other side. Crease it firmly.
8. Open the top of the model. Push your fingers into the opening to expand it. You have made a paper cup! This simple project is a perfect confidence builder for anyone following **step by step origami for beginners**.

The Foundation: Folding Your First Fortune Teller (Cootie Catcher)

8. Your model is complete. Put your thumbs and index fingers into the four flaps on the bottom. Push them outwards and upwards. The points will come together to form the classic fortune teller shape. This is a milestone in **step by step origami for beginners**.

Shaping the Crane

You now have a shape that looks like a diamond. Fold the top flaps down on both sides to form the crane's head and tail. Fold the bottom flap up to form the crane's body. The crane begins with a single page. • Page 7

create the head and tail. To make the head, choose one of the points and fold a small section of the tip down to create the beak. Finally, fold the wings down. Gently pull the wings apart to inflate the body of the crane. Congratulations! You have folded your first paper crane. This is a triumphant moment in any **step by step origami for beginners** journey.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them
