Brush the edges of the pastry with egg wash. Fold the pastry over the beef, encasing it completely. Press the edges to seal, then crimp with a fork. Trim any excess pastry from the ends, but leave enough to create a neat seal. Place the Wellington seam-side down on a baking tray lined with parchment paper. Brush the entire surface with egg wash. For a decorative touch, use the pastry trimmings to create leaf shapes or lattice patterns on top, brushing them with egg wash as well.
