Method 2: The Pneumatic (Air Powered) BB Gun

- A sturdy PVC pipe for the air reservoir (schedule 40 or 80 is recommended).

6. **Test the System:** Pump a low amount of pressure (20-30 PSI is plenty for testing). Load a BB, close the loading port, aim, and open the valve quickly. The burst of compressed air will propel the BB down the barrel.

Safety Note: PVC pipe can shatter under high pressure. Never exceed the rated PSI of your pipe. Use only pressure-rated PVC (schedule 80) for the reservoir.

Method 3: The Spring-Piston System
