Essential Supplies You Might Need

This method works well for small, fresh spots. For larger stains, move to the following techniques.

Method 2: Hydrogen Peroxide (Effective for Both Fresh and Dried Stains)

Hydrogen peroxide is a powerful oxidizing agent that breaks down blood proteins. However, it can bleach or lighten some carpets, especially wool or colored synthetics. Test it first on a hidden patch. For best results, use 3% hydrogen peroxide (the kind you find in drugstores).

1. Pour a small amount of hydrogen peroxide directly onto the stain. You can also use a spray bottle to apply it.

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2. Let it bubble and sit for about 5 to 10 minutes. Do not let it dry completely.
3. Blot the area with a clean white cloth. You should see the blood transferring to the cloth.
4. If the stain persists, repeat the process. For dried stubborn stains, you can create a paste of hydrogen peroxide and baking soda.
5. Rinse with cold water and blot dry.

Caution: Do not use hydrogen peroxide on wool or silk carpets. Always spot test first.

Method 3: Baking Soda and Vinegar (Natural Deep Clean)

This combination creates a fizzing action that helps lift stains. It is safe for most synthetic carpets but may affect natural fibers.

1. Cover the stain with a generous layer of baking soda.
2. In a spray bottle, mix one part white vinegar with two parts cold water.
3. Spray the vinegar solution over the baking soda until it fizzes. Allow it to bubble for 10-15 minutes.
4. Gently scrub with a soft brush or sponge, then blot the area with a clean cloth.
5. Vacuum up any dried baking soda residue after the area is completely dry.

Method 4: Salt Paste for Dried Blood Stains

Salt is a natural abrasive and absorbs moisture, making it useful for lifting dried stains.

1. Mix salt with a small amount of cold water to form a thick paste.
2. Apply the paste to the stain and let it sit for 30 minutes.
3. Gently rub the paste into the fibers using a soft cloth or sponge.
4. Blot with cold water to remove the salt, then vacuum when dry.

Method 5: Enzymatic Cleaners (Professional Grade)

Enzymatic cleaners are specifically designed to break down protein-based stains like blood, urine, and vomit. They are available at pet stores or online. These are especially effective for old or set-in stains.

1. Apply the enzymatic cleaner directly to the stain, following the product's instructions.

- **Berber carpets:** These are often looped and can be damaged by scrubbing. Blot carefully and avoid pulling loops.

Preventing Future
