Tips for Learning Your First Christmas Piece

Start with the Right Hand Only

Add the Left Hand Chords

Combine Slowly

Recognize these patterns, and use the finger numbers provided to guide your hand position. This "chunking" method is significantly faster than note-by-note reading.

Beyond the Notes: Making Your Performance Sound Festive

Playing the correct notes is one thing, but making the music sound like Christmas is another. Once you have the notes under your fingers, think about the feeling of the song. Use a fuller, bolder sound for "Joy to the World" than you would for the gentle lullaby of "Away in a Manger." Use the sustain pedal (the right pedal) sparingly to connect chords, but be careful not to blur the sound. A little bit of pedal goes a long way in creating that warm, resonant holiday sound. Finally, do not be afraid to add a slight *ritardando* (slowing down) at the end of a phrase or the final

chord. This musical breathing instinct is what separates a mechanical reading from a heartfelt performance.
