- **Strength (VIII):** Courage, inner strength, patience. Not brute force, but gentle control over one's passions.
- **The Hermit (IX):** Solitude, introspection, seeking truth. A

time to withdraw and find your own light.

- **Wheel of Fortune (X):** Cycles, change, fate. Life is in constant motion; this card signals a turning point.
- **Justice (XI):** Fairness, truth, cause and effect. Decisions based on careful evaluation.
- **The Hanged Man (XII):** Surrender, new perspectives, suspension. Letting go of control to see the world differently.
- **Death (XIII):** Transformation, endings, new beginnings. Rarely means physical death; instead, it signals profound change.
- **Temperance (XIV):** Balance, moderation, patience. Blending opposites to create harmony.
- **The Devil (XV):** Bondage, materialism, obsession. Facing your shadows and unhealthy attachments.
- **The Tower (XVI):** Sudden upheaval, revelation, destruction of false structures. Chaotic but necessary for growth.
- **The Star (XVII):** Hope, inspiration, serenity. A guiding light after a storm; renewal and healing.
- **The Moon (XVIII):** Illusion, fear, the unconscious. Things are not as they seem; navigate with intuition.
- **The Sun (XIX):** Joy, success, vitality. One of the most positive cards, representing happiness and clarity.
- **Judgement (XX):** Rebirth, inner calling, absolution. A final accounting and a new chapter.
- **The World (XXI):** Completion, accomplishment, fulfillment. The end of a cycle and joyful celebration.

The Minor Arcana: Daily Events and Emotions

While the Major Arcana deals with big themes, the **Rider Waite Tarot card meanings** in the Minor Arcana reflect everyday situations, challenges, and emotions. Each suit corresponds to a specific aspect of life, and the numbers (Ace to Ten) represent stages of a journey within that suit.
