On the large beads, we pray the "Eternal Father" prayer, offering the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus for the sins of the world. On the small beads, we pray the "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world." It concludes with a threefold repetition of "Holy God."

The Power of Repetition and Meditation

Like many traditional Catholic prayers, the Chaplet uses repetition not as vain repetition, but as a means of quieting the mind and entering the heart. When sung, this repetitive quality becomes even more meditative. The melodic structure of the Divine Mercy Chaplet Song EWTN allows the words to sink deep into the subconscious, making the prayer a continuous act of adoration and supplication throughout the day.
