Related Series: The Kane Chronicles

This Egyptian mythology series does not intersect directly with Percy Jackson except for a crossover story, but it is part of Rick Riordan's shared universe. The Sun and the Star (Nico and Will's Story)

Published in 2023, this novel follows Nico di Angelo and Will Solace into Tartarus. It takes place after *The Tower of Nero* and is considered a standalone addition to the **Percy Jackson series list in order**. It is best read after completing *The Trials of Apollo*.
